# Our Expectations

Students with less than 97% attendance are statistically more likely to see negative progress and achievement in their exam results.

On average, every 15 days of learning missed throughout their time in secondary school can lead to at least one grade less in one subject.

In contrast students students with little or no absence from school are twice as likely to achieve at least 5 grade 5s or above in the GCSE (or vocational equivalents).



- Medical and dental appointments are classed as 'absent'. Whilst authorised, they do affect your child's attendance. Please provide medical evidence where possible and do try to keep appointments outside of school hours.
- If a student arrives **after 09:30**, they are marked as '**absent'** for that morning session, even if they arrive at some point during the morning.
- DfE guidance means that we are **only allowed to authorise absences** in **exceptional circumstances**.
- The DfE **do not** permit holidays in term-time to be authorised.

## Literacy and Reading in Tutor





### Tutor time reading

- You will use your bookmark a lot when reading! Your form tutor will also use it to ask questions before, during and after reading.
- · Your bookmark is double sided. One side is for reciprocal reading and the other is your 'ruler' to track the text.
- · You will use reading strategies (predicting, clarifying, questioning and summarising) to improve your reading comprehension.

#### Reading Strategies Predict - Clarity - Guestion - Summaris

Activate prior knowledg What do you already know about\_?

Do you remember the time we read: watched/visited\_?

#### Student prediction stems:

- Based on the title, I predict this is going to be

Character	Description				
Scrooge	The protagonist initially dismisses the goodwill and generosity associated with Christmas. After being forced to transform, he becomes a symbol of Christmas spirit in Stave Five. He is a dynamic character (a character who changes). A man who seems to embody everything about relentlessly striving capitalist spirit of the time.				
Bob Cratchit	Bob is Scrooge's downtrodden but loyal employee. His family are a symbol of Victorian poverty, cheerfulness in adversity, togetherness and Christmas Spirit. Bob shows pity for Scrooge, and provides a contrast to Scrooge's isolation and meanness.  Fred epitomises the concept of goodwill and forgiveness, refusing to be discouraged by his uncle's misery. People (such as the Cratchits) speak highly of Fred and his generosity, in contrast to how they speak of Scrooge. Fred shows that Scrooge has chosen isolation and shows forgiveness to Scrooge, welcoming him in Stave Five.


